## Singing the song

- Talk to the children about the Masai (pronounced *mass-eye*) tribe who live in Kenya. The Masai tribe wear brightly coloured red clothes and jewellery and live in homemade mud huts in the woods.
- Explain that the adult Masai men become 'Masai warriors' and look after the other tribe members by hunting with spears to provide food and safety for the rest of the tribe. Masai warriors stand tall and proud.
- Encourage the children to stand up tall while singing the song and, if possible, wear brightly coloured red clothing made from painted sheets.
